PLAYER OF THE YEAR STANDINGS

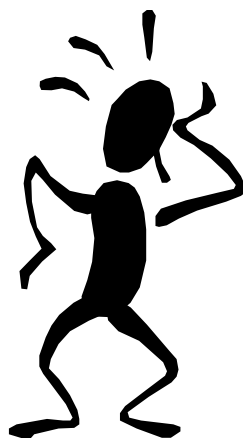
Almost there! The Player of the Year standings leading up to the Club Championship show a continued battle at the top.

RULES OF GOLF

With the Club Championship wrapping up the golf year, it is a good time to review some rules of golf that can (and do) affect us. The SMGC, like other established golf clubs, plays by the official Rules of Golf, therefore it is imperative that all members know the rules.



Rule 6-3 discusses starting times. Specifically for stroke play, "The player must start at the time established by the Committee." The penalty for breaking Rule 6-3 is disqualification – a harsh penalty perhaps, and often overlooked for casual play (in addition to casual tournaments). However, for major events the penalty cannot be waived for the sake of protecting the rest of the field.

Let's assume you've arrived on time and finish your round of golf and you're ready to visit the bar. Your job isn't done yet. Make sure you carefully review your scorecard before signing it. Rule 6-6b states, "After completion of the round, the competitor should check his score for each hole and settle any doubtful points with the Committee. He must ensure that the marker or markers have signed the score card, sign the score card himself and return it to the Committee as soon as possible." What if you signed a card with a number of strokes lower than what you actually took on a hole? Rule 6-6d is very clear with that unfortunate error. "The competitor is responsible for the correctness of the score recorded for each hole on his score card. If he returns a score for any hole lower than actually taken, he is disqualified. If he returns a score for any hole higher than actually taken, the score as returned stands."

Sadly, both of these situations occurred during our Club Championship and resulted in disqualifications. Both were innocent errors by honest guys, but they lead to unfortunate consequences.

ARE YOU PROTECTED?

You love to golf, right? As you feel the magnetic pull toward a great course, are you prepared for the risks of skin cancer?

You should know that...

...the majority of people diagnosed with melanoma are white men over age 50.

...skin cancer is the #1 cancer in men over age 50, ahead of prostate, lung and colon cancer.

...middle-aged and older men have the poorest track record for performing monthly skin self-exams or regularly visiting a dermatologist. They are the least likely individuals to detect melanoma in its early stages.

...men over 40 spend the most time outdoors and have the highest annual exposure to ultraviolet radiation.

Given our club's member demographics, at least one of these statements applies to you, or will soon.

Now, here's what you can do. First, check every inch of your body for anything unusual. Anything that doesn't look normal, even small moles with an irregular shape are worth a check-up.

Next, wear sunscreen with an SPF greater than 15. (Hey, dark tans went out in the 70s.) Even an overcast day at Pacific Grove warrants sunscreen. If you're more likely to use it, look for a spray version. Even if you have the luxury of darker skin you're still at risk. You may not burn easily, but skin cancer can still occur.

Finally, cover up with a hat with an all-around brim. No, not terribly sexy, but neither are scars where cancerous cells have been removed. Long-sleeved shirts are another great protection.

When in doubt, see a doctor for a "mole patrol." But, keep in mind that skin cancer doesn't always arrive dressed like a mole. Any skin irregularity should be checked. You want to be out on the golf course 'til they have to carry off, right? Protecting your largest organ, your skin, can help ensure you'll be there for a while.
